OUR EXPERIENCE OF LAPAROSCOPIC COLPOSUSPENSION SHORT TERM OUTCOMES AND PATIENT JOURNEY OVER TWELVE MONTHS DURING THE COVID ERA

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As incontinence mesh tapes are long gone in the UK, our women with Urodynamic Stress-Incontinence(USI) have the surgical options of only a trio of high vigilance procedures Colposuspension, Autologous fascial sling and Urethral Bulking agents1. Laparoscopic colposuspension is rapidly gaining popularity over open colposuspension and we audited our unit experience of this specialised procedure from 1/12/2021 to 30/11/2022. Sample size -7 women. Our aim was to identify any common pitfalls in practice and trends in patient management during peak COVID-19 times when Urogynaecology procedures hit all time low numbers.

Outcomes:

• All women had procedures completed laparoscopically.

• One woman had intraoperative complication of Ethibond sutures in the bladder which was removed and sutures reapplied; she reported worsening stress incontinence at three months follow up.

- One woman had post operative urinary retention.
- Three out of seven patients have had post operative followup at 3-6 months. 2 of them had good improvement in SUI Good practice identified:

• All women were offered conservative measures as per NICE guidance2 like lifestyle, supervised-pelvic floor exercise, urodynamics, consent for BSUG database, use of validated ICIQ questionnaires, follow up at 3-6 months and patient information leaflets. Other learning:

• All patients had delays to access service for months.

• Majority of patients had telephone consultations and one woman did not have documented pelvic exam prior to procedure as all her appointments were over telephone.

- Only 3 out of 7 women were documented to have been given NICE Patient decision aid.
- Only one patient had documented BSUG data base entry at postoperative appointment at 3 months.
- Average follow up appointment takes 6-months due to COVID-pressures.
